








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Taking fun seriously



Our Light Up A Life Service is an annual December event that allows for and encourages reflection on the past year and memories of loved ones this Christmas.

This year's non-denominational service will be held at St. Mary's Church in Rawtenstall on the evening of Thursday 8th December and will feature readings, song and entertainment. There will be tea, mince pies and time to mingle with others.

Crawshawbooth Primary School Choir will treat attendees to song whilst the 2nd Rossendale Scout Band will provide rousing brass band music, perfect for the season. There will also be memorial items to purchase in advance or on the night such as mini wreaths and lapel badges.

Those making a dedication will be able to attend the evening service if they wish. We hope to see you at there and share the evening with you.






How to book
