
Sunflower Memories

Dionne's story

A dedicated salon owner whose Mum received care from our team. Her journey is a powerful reminder of how important it is for us to come together to support one another through life's most challenging moments.

"My Mum Theresa Shackleton used the services with Rossendale Hospice in 2009 when she sadly became ill with triple negative breast cancer. She absolutely loved to come and spend time with the other ladies in similar situations. We had never experienced anybody in our family have cancer before and never thought about how traumatic it can be, so it was amazing for her to go and spend time and make friends with people who truly understood how she was feeling and what she was going through.

Because she benefited so much from the services provided by Rossendale Hospice, I thought it would be the perfect opportunity for me and my clients at Fakery Refined Beauty & Aesthetics to fundraise and get involved with the Beauty Heroes campaign.

She would glow after her sessions with the hospice. She had reflexology and massage which she loved! My Mum also loved to talk, when she would come back from her wellness sessions/day therapy she would tell us all about the updates on her friend's journeys with their treatment, she really looked forward to catching up with the other ladies and made so many friends!

My Mum passed away peacefully asleep in 2010 (after having sleep talked all night about her clothes shop!) I struggled with anxiety and depression coming to terms with what we had experienced, it was a very lonely and isolating time for me. I attended a few bereavement counselling sessions at the hospice, it was nice to share how I was feeling with no judgement.

I saw for myself how cruel cancer can be. Rossendale Hospice offer so many services for patients and carers that you can benefit from, you are not alone! Even the little things they do

mean so much and I hope the Hospice will be able to continue

providing their services and support to the people of Rossendale with our help of donations!"

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Young entrepreneurs raise nearly £12,000 for Rossendale Hospice

Five Valley schools raised a record amount for Rossendale Hospice in an entrepreneurial challenge.

The event, organised by Rossendale Hospice and supported by Alder Grange School, is in its 10th year and has so far raised over £35,000 for the hospice. The five schools raised a combined total of £11,873.93 in this year's 'Youth Enterprise Challenge'.

The contest, launched in November of 2024, lasting twelve weeks and saw Year 9 & 10 teams from Alder Grange, Whitworth Community High School, Bacup and Rawtenstall Grammar School (BRGS), Haslingden High School and All Saints High School all come up with enterprising initiatives to generate as much income as possible to be donated to the Hospice.

The schools were judged on seven award categories; Most Profit Raised, Most Money Raised Per Pupil, Most Innovative Idea, Greatest Community Involvement, Best Presentation, Special Recognition Award, and the Fundraisers Achievement Award.

The Most Profit Raised award went to Bacup and Rawtenstall Grammar School (BRGS) raising a spectacular £6,227.82, undergoing various activities including a 12K run over the Christmas period.

BRGS earned a further award – Most money raised (per pupil in School.) The pupils raised an incredible £5.90 each.

Haslingden High School, stole the top spot for the Greatest Community Involvement Award with their Winter Showcase. They won over the community with their performances from Blood Brothers, Wicked and many more.

Lucy Howarth from Alder Grange stood out and won the **Fundraiser's Achievement Award**. She spent time contacting Burnley Football Club and arranging for a signed Burnley Football shirt to later be used in the raffle, which accounted for £790.10 of their total amount raised.

The next award was awarded to All Saints High School for the **Most innovative fundraising idea Award** for their 'Denim sale.' They had the creative idea to get all types of denim clothing donated which they later sold for £1 per piece. Raising a total of £70 from the sale.

Whitworth Community showed great passion and enthusiasm when showing their presentation, they went into great detail about how they raised the money for the hospice and the different ideas that they had, winning the award for **Best**Presentation.

Last but certainly not least, the **Special Recognition Award** had clear winners – Josh McLean, Max Harrison and Henry Sagar for completing the 12K's of Christmas.

The three BRGS students decided to take on a mammoth task to run 1k starting on Christmas day 1, 2k on day 2, 3k on day 3 and so on, until they got to their 12th day when they ran 12k in the heavy snow and freezing cold. The students persevered throughout the long days and raised a total of £1,434.24 between the three of them.

The Hospice were thrilled to have the Mayor of Rossendale join them for the celebration event to present all the awards to the students, along with representatives from the Hospice.

Grace Cole – Supporter Engagement Fundraiser of the Hospice, said: 'It's been wonderful to see how much the students have learnt and developed over the past 12 weeks, watching their confidence grow and their passion for fundraising for the hospice has been truly special.'

Gift Aid

Gift Aid is a government scheme that allows charities like ours to claim an extra 25% on top of donations. To do this, we require you to inform us whether you are a UK taxpayer. Whether you are making a cash donation or simply donating an item in one of our Charity Shops, we ask that you tick the 'Gift Aid my donation' box. This will not cost you a penny extra but will make all the difference to us and to any future donations you make. In 2024 we claimed an extra £17,000 on top of donations from Gift Aid!

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Allow us to introduce Hazel, a star in our midst

During the long, lonely days of Covid and lock down in 2020, Hazel Holland sat down with her morning cuppa to tune into GMB (Good Morning Britain), The Lorraine Show.

On one particular morning Lorraine's "Change & Check" campaign was being broadcast.

The campaign is to raise awareness of breast cancer signs and symptoms and encourage early detection. Hazel watched and listened and discovered that she too had noticed 2 of the changes discussed in herself. She fleetingly thought of going to her GP.

A week or so later the campaign was airing again during the show and this time she could recognise more of the symptoms. Without hesitation and prompted by her own instincts she phoned her GP and was called into the surgery.

During the appointment her GP was clearly concerned and referred her straight away to Burnley General Teaching Hospital Breast Service.

The consultant performed various tests, including a biopsy, and was clearly concerned. A phone call 2 days later asked Hazel to go along to the clinic and to bring her Husband along.

Whilst asking Hazel if she would mind sharing her story with us at the Hospice, she openly admitted that she knew she had breast cancer, which the Consultant confirmed.

He discussed her treatment plan starting with Chemotherapy, followed by a mastectomy and follow up radiotherapy.

Anyone knowing Hazel will tell you that she is a very strong and positive lady, which is exactly how she approached her diagnosis and treatment. She refused to give into the pain, with a smile on her face and always a sense of humour.

Only one day following her surgery she decided she was going to come along to the Hospice to our Early Diagnosis Session (albeit with some apprehension). She quickly discovered that at these sessions there is a Senior Nurse with many years of experience and a group of ladies, expert by experience, who could really say to her "We understand what you are going through, because they were.

She really appreciated coming along to further sessions, feeling it was a "safe space" where she could openly speak about anything and everything and above all how it was acceptable to laugh or cry, (which she tells me all of the group did).

Having completed the 12 sessions offered to patients attending the Early Diagnosis session she moved on to live her life to the full.

Late September 2022 Hazel, her Husband Nigel and family were finally able to travel and flew off to Portugal for a much-needed dose of sunshine and laughter.

Very early on in the holiday, Hazel noticed some changes in her other breast, just like the ones she had detected the first time around. Yet again her suspicions were confirmed and therein followed more chemotherapy, mastectomy, and radiotherapy.

You could be forgiven for thinking that anyone in Hazel's position would understandably not feel so positive and determined, but this lady is a fighter.

Inspired by Helen Addis, who features on the ITV Lorraine show, Hazel contacted her and before long was involved in a whole host of activities, including climbing the O2, yes seriously, the Bristol Balloon Festival and in 2023 joined the Change & Check Choir, appearing on The Lorraine Show no less!

The choir has gone from strength to strength. GMB has created a charity single with Scottish singer Marti Pellow and choir members, including Hazel who discovered they had breast cancer after watching her chat show!

The choir was also invited to appear on last years Royal Variety Show.

It was an absolute joy and privilege to hear Hazel share her story with us. She is very candid, honest, and above all, an inspiration to us all.


Hazel, like many people, was very fearful of the word "Hospice".

She wasn't sure what to expect when she was referred to Rossendale Hospice, but decided to give it a go and if she didn't feel it was for her, simply thought she wouldn't come again.

Hazel feels that the Hospice is a "safe space", very homely in lovely surroundings; a team of Nurses on hand to offer support and advice; a great group of women, who really can say they get it and above all, much laughter, despite the tears.

Rossendale Hospice join Hospice UK's 'This is Hospice Care' Gifts in Wills Campaign

Rossendale Hospice has collaborated with 143 other hospices across the UK to launch the campaign, 'This is Hospice Care'. The campaign is led by Hospice UK and aims to raise awareness of the vital role hospices play in communities and shift perceptions of Hospice care. Following the campaign's launch on 17th February 2025, a

compelling TV advert, featuring real-life hospice stories was broadcast nationwide, supported by widespread media coverage. The campaign's goal is to encourage individuals to support their local hospice by leaving a gift in their Will, ensuring these essential services continue to provide compassionate, specialist care for years to come.



"It is essential to consider the future of Hospice Care and how we, as a community, can support these vital services. We encourage you to leave a gift in your Will to help ensure that compassionate care continues for generations to come." said Irene Smith, CEO, Rossendale Hospice.

Gifts in Wills are crucial to the survival and growth of hospices across the country, providing 15% of the Voluntary income that hospices rely on to deliver essential care. In 2022-2023, hospices across the UK provided palliative and end of life care to 300,000 people; a number that is predicted to increase in coming years. This increase in demand places unprecedented pressure on Hospices, which already heavily rely on support and funds raised within local communities.

At Rossendale Hospice, it costs in excess of around £1.2 million annually to cover running costs, with only 23% of funding received from the NHS. This means that we rely on our local community to raise around in excess of £900,000 each year to continue providing our free services. By leaving a gift in your Will, you can help to ensure that Rossendale Hospice continues to be the beacon of care, comfort, and compassion for generations to come-because we believe everyone deserves comfort, compassion and dignity in their final moments.
